
Goings On: NFHC Around the Town

> Celia came to the Women's Shelter after fleeing a severely abusive husband in Tucson. She had many challenges to overcome, including fibromyalgia that caused extreme pain and recovering from an addiction to painkillers originally prescribed for her fibromyalgia. While taking the

time to heal emotionally, Celia also found the strength to seek medical help through NFHC's free services and partnerships. Celia met with a Naturopathic doctor and a volunteer Reiki master to work on a treatment plan for her fibromyalgia that did not involve painkillers or any pharmaceuticals.

This ultimately set Celia free of pain and completely changed her life! Once her pain disappeared, Celia was able to seek support from NFHC's staff and counseling services and was able to process her history of being abused in a way that felt safe and supportive. Celia stayed in shelter for four months and during that time, she used the help of the Legal Advocate to file for divorce, became a preschool volunteer, and secured permanent housing and full time employment. Celia reported that her time in the Women's Shelter helped her feel "alive again."

Celia's story is one of true perseverance and success!
